

#### Context

In 2023/24, HEP delivered termly Subject Leader Networks across 15 subjects (except for Computing delivered in Autumn and Spring only). Running a Subject Network week, allowed leaders overseeing multiple subjects in their school to attend one or more of the sessions, if they wanted. In addition, HEP provided written guidance for both <u>facilitators</u> and <u>delegates</u> to outline expectations and to support network meetings to run efficiently and smoothly.


#### Here are some Summer term attendance numbers:

There were 26 new bookings for Summer term networks taking the total number of registered subject leaders to 657 across 49 primary schools. 339 (52%) registered Subject Leaders attended a network, down by 13% from Spring term. 318 subject leaders did not attend. **Table 1** below shows a summary of attendance and completed evaluations across the year.

### **Overall attendance**





To try and understand why attendance declined over the year, HEP added a question to the evaluation form for delegates to reflect. HEP collected data from **191** subject leaders across 14 subjects and found that **89%** attended all three network sessions across the year. Teachers faced various challenges that affected their attendance at scheduled sessions across different subjects. Here are their main reasons for non-attendance:

- Illness
- Clash with another subject network, school-led CPD, external CPD, Governor meeting, parents evening, school event
- Subject lead didn't know about it, signed up too late
- Recently appointed
- Residential trip
- School incident
- Family emergency, childcare issues, not a work day, maternity leave
- ICT issues

#### **Delegate reflections**

Here's an overview of **191** delegate reflections across **14 subjects**:

- 82% have increased their subject knowledge.
- 80% have increased confidence as a subject leader.
- 88% enjoyed sharing practice with, and gathering ideas from, the facilitator and other leaders.
- 80% felt that having the agenda and online meeting guidance beforehand, helped them to participate fully.
- 83% have made the most of the network sessions.
- 75% are better able to support teachers with planning and delivery.
- 78% felt the length of the networks was sufficient.
- 79% said online networking met their expectations.
- 86% said the quality of the subject specialist met their expectations.

Suggestions to improve future network meetings:

- Encourage all delegates to engage in breakout room discussions, share practice and to have cameras and microphones on.
- Extend the time and size for breakout room discussions, allowing a few extra minutes to prevent cutting off valuable discussions and to increase participation.
- Invite teachers to share excellent practices or expertise in each session.
- Prioritise sessions based on attendee needs and specific key stages
- Cover more content on implementing AfL (Assessment for Learning) in lessons.
- Discuss monitoring and tracking subjects like music and art, and subject lead expectations.
- Provide practical advice and resources for use in the classroom. Offer guidance on planning, monitoring, and assessments. Share resources beyond common ones (e.g., beyond Charanga for music).
- Ensure reliable technology to avoid issues like lack of cameras, non-functioning audio, and poor internet access. Provide test or pre-meeting videos and slides to prepare and avoid technical issues.
- Consider shorter sessions (e.g. one-hour meetings) or earlier/later start times. Schedule meetings to avoid interruptions during PPA time and vary meeting days to accommodate different schedules.
- Mix face-to-face and online meetings for flexibility and better engagement. Occasionally incorporate in-person meetings for practical activities and resource sharing.
- Provide more opportunities for subject leaders to visit local schools to support colleagues in developing subject knowledge and managing subjects.

Participants were encouraged to use the free resources for staff training, adaptation, or as inspiration rather than directly off the shelf. Chat room discussions were lively, with many using or adapting schemes like Cornerstones, Kapow, and Plan B.

#### Primary Subject Leader networks 2024/25

- Dr Paula Owens is retiring from delivering the Geography network, details of her replacement are yet to be confirmed.
- Florence Ackland will take over the PSHE network, replacing Karen Summer.
- Naomi Hiscock from Primary STEM Education Consultancy will take over the Science network, replacing Corinne Stevenson.
- James Walsh will return to lead the Computing network.

#### Feedback:

- A Google form will gather facilitator feedback following each subject leader network session
- HEP will send resources and facilitator feedback to Subject Leaders
- HEP will monitor and report attendance each term
- A Google form will gather delegate feedback in the summer term to inform the end-of-year report



What will continue:

- You only need to book once to attend all three sessions across the year.
- Online sessions except for PE (in-person practical sessions in Autumn and Summer terms).
- Network week to allow multiple-subject leaders to attend more than one session.
- 90-minute sessions to allow time for rich discussions and networking experiences.
